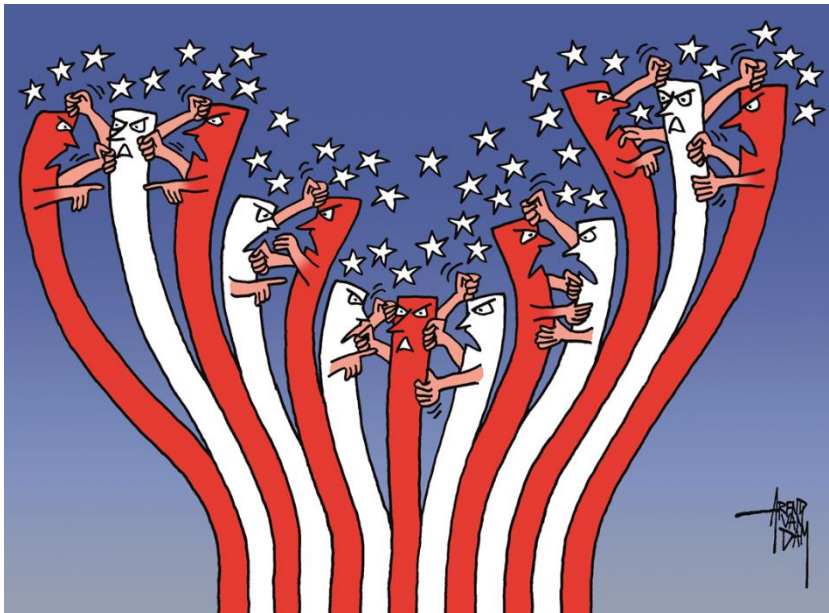

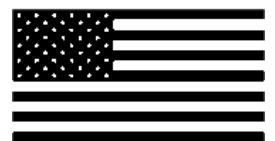
The election of Donald Trump has drawn attention to the polarization currently endemic to the United States. Urban versus rural, highly educated versus less educated, economically vibrant versus economically threatened: these dimensions were on display in November 2016 and continue to divide the country. The recent U.S. Senate special election in Alabama, in which a Democrat defeated a controversial Republican candidate who was endorsed by President Trump, illustrates how political divisions that characterized the 2016 presidential election show no signs of fading.
