
## CURRENT ISSUES IN NORTH AMERICAN AND CULTURAL STUDIES

## American Literature and Digital Selfhood: Algorithms, Affect, Attention

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While algorithms have come to shape the ways of 'writing the self', for example through data tracking and recording, personalized recommendation systems, and online identity curation, traditional literary fiction has also increasingly negotiated the ways of being in and algorithmically experiencing our driven. environment. This talk will look at contemporary US American novels that critically inquire into modes of algorithmic self-writing, by scrutinizing the ways in which digital affect and automated scripts play into the construction of selfhood while navigating commercial forces of the attention economy. With a particular focus on female digital experiences, this talk reframes critical perspectives on human entanglements with technology and explores the ambiguities of the digital pharmakon as posthuman spaces of failed knowledge.
